



Vehicle Security Guidance

Security advice and top tips from your local Policing Team.

Follow the checklist and tick as appropriate to help prevent you from becoming a victim of vehicle crime.

1 Where is your vehicle parked?

Try and park in well lit, busier areas.

If you are using a car park, look for a site that is 'Park Mark' accredited.

Parking at home: Protect keyless or higher value vehicles by blocking them in or use collapsible bollards.

2 Have you removed valuables from your vehicle?

Items should be removed, or hidden out of sight, no matter what the value to you. Even a few coins can be worth it to a thief.

3 Is your vehicle locked when not in use?

Always lock the vehicle and close windows and sunroofs when the vehicle is unattended to prevent an opportunist.

4 Do you have additional vehicle security?

Fitting a Sold Secure steering wheel, gear lever or clutch pedal security device will give you added protection.

5 Do you fully check your vehicle is locked?

Devices can be used to jam the signal from your key. Manually check your vehicle has locked before walking away.

6 Are your keys in a safe place?

Thieves can retrieve keys through your letterbox. Keep keys out of sight and away from doors and windows.

7 Is your vehicle keyless entry?

Thieves can intercept the signal from your key from a few metres away, including when kept in your home.

Keep all keys well away from the car.

Put keys in a signal blocking pouch (Faraday pouch).

If you can, turn off wireless signals on your fob when not in use.

Reprogramme keys if buying a second hand car.

Remember, thieves need either the original car keys or access to your keyless signal to steal your vehicle. If this means committing burglary to obtain the keys they will, so make sure you follow our advice on keeping your home safe.
